

The written warning, which was introduced at trial as an exhibit, states as follows:

You have the right to remain silent. If you give up the right to remain silent, anything you say can be used against you in court. You have the right to talk to a lawyer before answering any of our questions. If you cannot afford to hire a lawyer, one will be appointed for you without cost and before any questioning. You have the right to use any of these rights at any time you want during this interview.

The written warning did not state that Powell had the right to have counsel present with him during the interrogation.
